Regulatory Assistance Project launches Council of Commissioners to unlock affordable energy for Americans

Peer group will leverage former commissioners' experience and expertise

- Why it matters: As stress on the energy system increases, regulators and policymakers must reform regulatory practices to secure access to clean, affordable and reliable energy for all.
- Why it's different: RAP is innovating by bringing together former commissioners, who can speak candidly and with authority on what's holding back progress in U.S. energy systems.
- Why now: When even common-sense reforms have become polarized, this bipartisan group can rise above the fray to focus on real, actionable solutions.

WASHINGTON, D.C. — A new initiative by the Regulatory Assistance Project (RAP)® is taking a fresh approach to tackling the bold energy system reforms needed to ensure everyone has access to affordable, reliable, clean and secure energy.

RAP announced the launch today of its **Council of Commissioners**. The nine-person council is a politically diverse group of former state utility commissioners representing all U.S. regions.

By combining this deep regulatory experience with RAP's analytical expertise, the council will help refocus the national debate on constructive, solutions-oriented reform. The council will weigh in on issues of national importance, speaking candidly and with authority on the structural issues holding the country back from an affordable, future-ready energy system.
